

Advanced Orchestration of Bridges of Incidents: A Non-Dual Framework Under the Dynamic Vacuum Approach

2 Fundamentals of the Dynamic Vacuum Approach

2.1 Dynamic Vacuum Concept

The Dynamic Vacuum Approach posits that the entire universe is a singular, ever-updating field, never truly partitioned from itself [2]. An individual imagines winning the lottery. Five years later, they suddenly feel an urge to drive to a store, buy a ticket, and discover an unrelated outcome (meeting a future

The orchestrator might embed sub-manifestations (e.g., meeting a spouse) into the final unfolding, all while apparently failing the original “win the lottery” but fulfilling *another* imaginal act the person introduced along the way.

4.2 Nested Desires and Bridges

Often, new desires arise mid-bridge. These new imaginal acts:

- Might spawn additional bridging events.
- Could accelerate, re-route, or overshadow earlier manifestations.

Mathematically, the universal state $U(t)$ gains a new “target sub-state,” changing the minimal bridging path solution in real time. The system effectively solves multiple nested or parallel $\mathcal{B}^*$ problems at once.

5 Graphical Representation of Orchestrated Paths
